I read a lot of these mysteries, and I think I know a thing or two about a good mystery. So without further ado, I present to you my dear Bullsheet friends, my list of the top 5 Cozies of the decade.

1. Full Bodied Murder by Christine E. Blum (December 2017)

The first book in my all time favorite cozy series! The Rose Avenue Wine Club Mysteries series follows the hijinks of one group of middle-aged women living in a beautiful suburb near San Diego, California, whose main passions are drinking wine.
