I've always liked superheroes. Young Meredith once wore a neon yellow shirt with the Batman logo for a whole week. I had Batman pajamas with a detachable cape, I wore them long after I outgrew them, and I played with squinkies that were Marvel and DC. Growing up, I watched Young Justice, and I saw the CW versions of the Flash and Supergirl. Recently, I got back into reading DC comics. Upon some self-reflection, this wasn't just because of my long-established love of superheroes; rather, I found it was a form of escapism. In our ever-worsening world situation, wouldn't it be nice to have superheroes fighting our villains?

These comic books often mirror our own reality, as the villains in these books are also corrupt, wealthy white men. While on this resurgence of interest in the topic, I've been thinking a lot about superhero movie adaptations, and the fact that most of them are pretty bad. That's a harsh criticism from me because, as I said, I watched the CW adaptations and I liked them, but I want to clarify that I don't think they are that good either. However, the CW can explore a lot of emotional turmoil that motivates these characters, which movies don't. I want to let you all know two things: one, I like DC more than Marvel, and two, I think Marvel movies are better than DC because the DCCU is garbage. I say the DCCU is garbage, but I won't give Marvel all the credit because my opinion about the MCU isn't that good either. By far the best film adaptations of superheroes are the Spider-Verse movies and LEGO Batman. Spider-Verse is the best overall. I recognize these movies are animated, not live action, you can see in Spider-Verse the inspiration taken from the comic book, but I think making a good superhero movie in live action is possible. Spider-Verse does a good job of balancing humor, suspense, and serious conflict. On the other hand, Lego Batman is a satirization of the character that I really enjoyed. The main issue I have with both Marvel and DC's live-action movies is that the writing really lacks because they don't give the characters much nuance. I think after this summer, with the release of Superman and Fantastic Four, it's clear that people want more superhero movies. I saw Superman. I thought it was a shockingly good DCCU movie; it was very topical to our real-world situation. However, everyone is getting excited for the "James Gunn DCCU," and I am really not. I don't want the new DCCU to become what Marvel has become, because these Marvel movies aren't good anymore. I'll give it to Gunn, Guardians of the Galaxy (and the second one, if I'm remembering correctly) were excellent movies, but I don't want cookie-cutter superhero movies anymore. I don't necessarily want these movies to become darker and more twisted, getting at the more gruesome elements of the genre, as I said, I just want these characters to have nuance, and for God's sake, give us a variety. The murder mystery aspect of The Batman was amazing. Matt Reeves did a fantastic job adapting the character, and I think the two best things he did were not creating an origin movie and letting Batman shine as a detective. I think it's about time for a movie about Nightwing, the Robins, or the Batgirls. These relationships that Batman has with these characters are incredibly complex, and I'm ready for someone to explore those dynamics in a movie format. I know there are plenty of other superheroes, especially in the DCCU, that have been done dirty or not done at all, and I think those characters also deserve well-written movies. I am only highlighting Batman so much because I know his story best. My last few notes are: go back to the source material, and make more women lead superhero movies, specifically ones with good writing.
